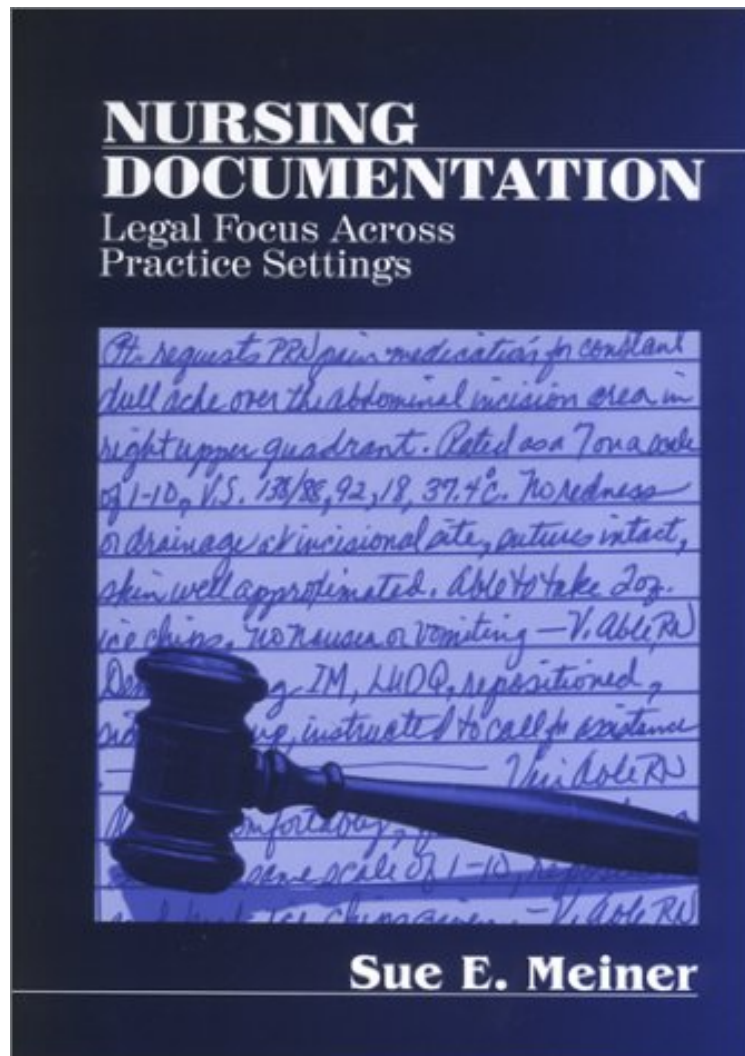


# Nursing Documentation: Legal Focus across Practice Settings
