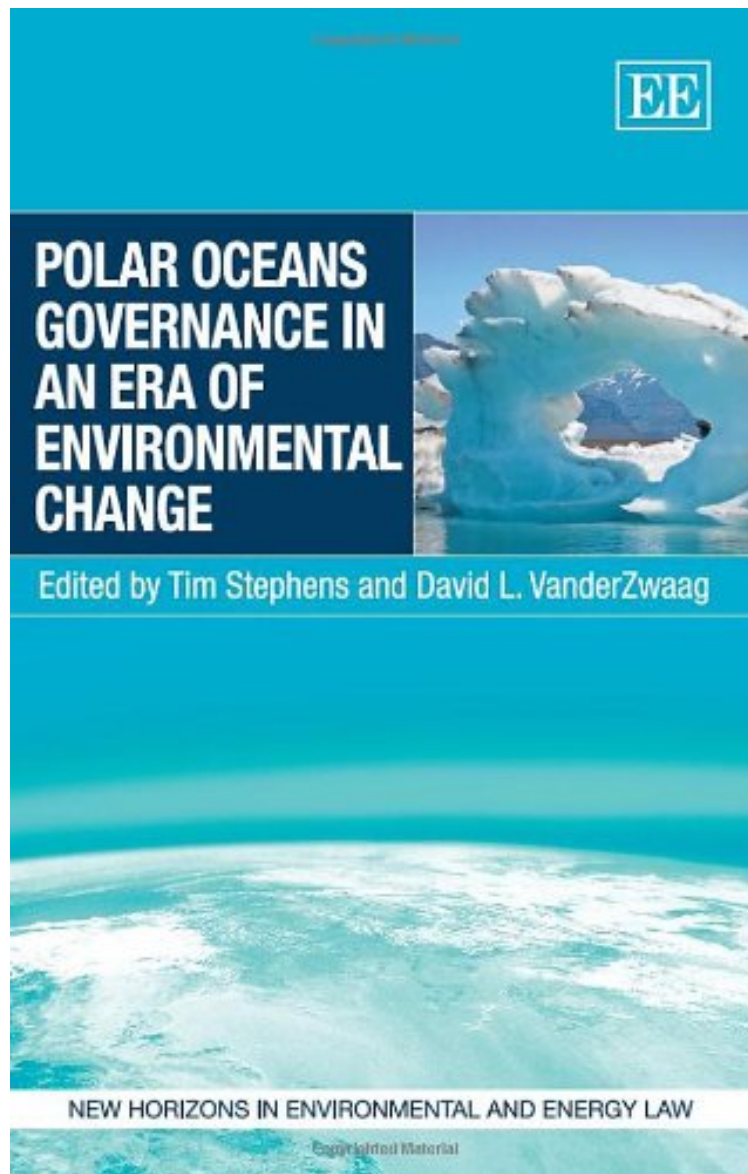


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## **Polar Oceans Governance in an Era of Environmental Change (New Horizons in Environmental and Energy Law series)**
